Example – Person-centred care



- Person centred care as dominant idea in healthcare
- Focusing on the care needs of the individual, being respectful and responsive to individual
- People rather than patients
- It's not a panacea though –
 - Goodley raises questions about who is the person/individual?
 - Individualised ignores structural inequalities
 - Transforms patients into individual “service users”, marketised NHS.

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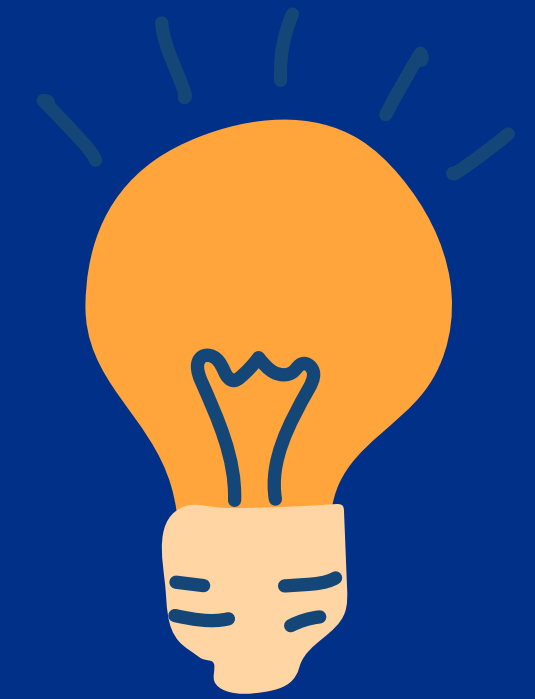

What do we do next?

- Explore what existing theories and philosophies have to say about the self-advocates' ideas
- Produce plain English and Easy Read summaries
- Go back and discuss these ideas with the self-advocates. Do they resonate?

Example 1. "Part of this world"

- What do theories about belonging and identity tell us about what it means to feel a part of this world?
- What can we learn from post-colonial scholars about belonging?
- How can we apply ideas about race, post-colonialism, and diaspora to disability studies?

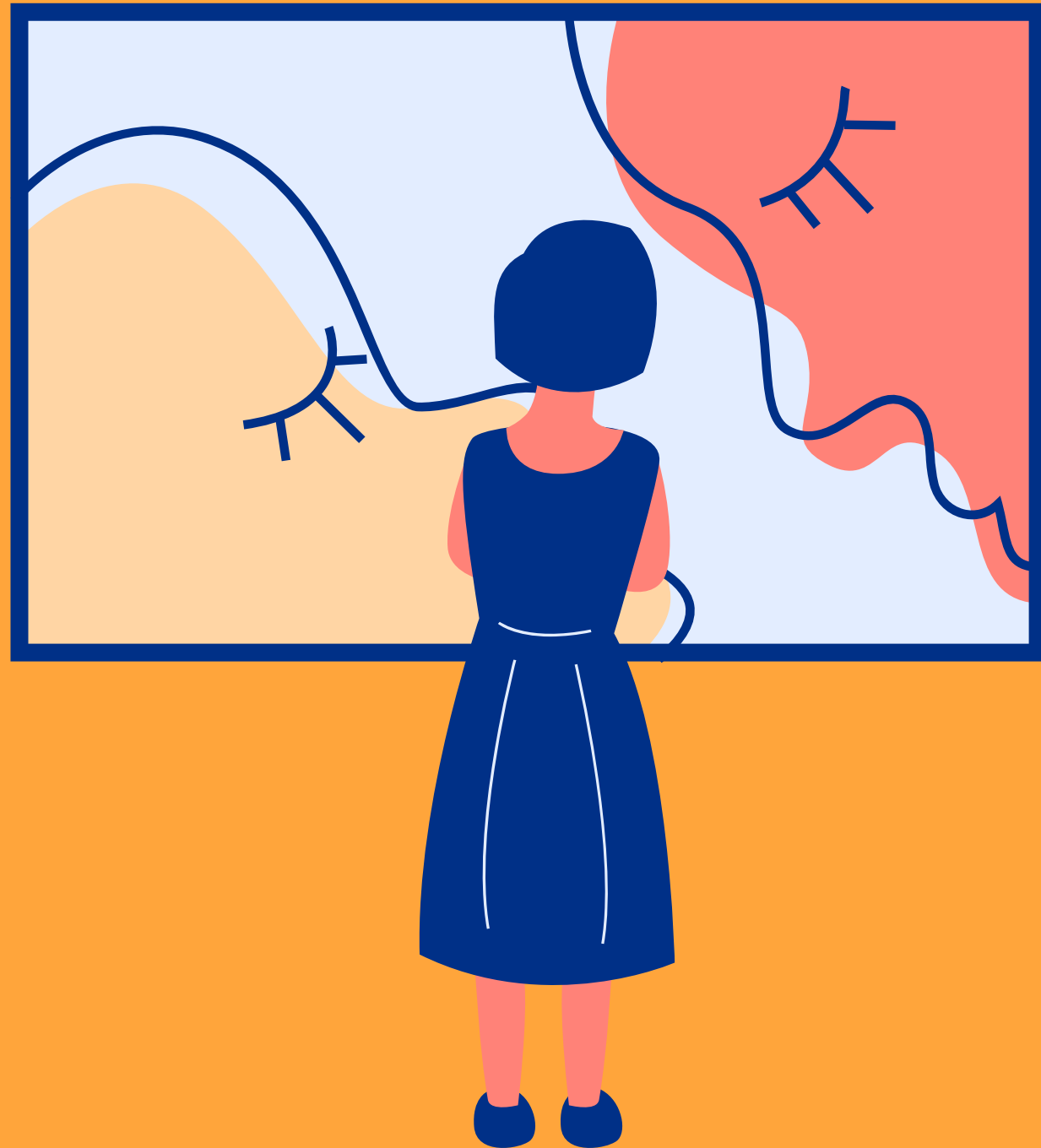
Example 2. Being listened to and feeling heard
